



GAP Visits New Florida University

CBR'S GAP TOUR OF FLORIDA UNIVERSITIES made its third stop at University of South Florida on February 22-23. Canadian Centre for Bio-Ethical Reform, CBR-Midwest, and CBR-Florida teamed up to plan and conduct this Genocide Awareness Project (GAP) tour of four Florida universities. CBR-Midwest Director Mark Harrington and Canadian CBR Executive Director Stephanie Gray provided leadership for Cornerstone Christian Fellowship, the sponsoring student group. They reserved the best location on campus for students to see our photo display, which contrasts abortion and other recognized forms of genocide.

The GAP team of staff and volunteers consisted of people from Canada, the U.S. and South Africa. Canadian volunteer Ania was new to GAP. Her first conversation was with a skeptic who thought our team came “to shove [y]our religious beliefs down other people’s throats,” and that “abortion should be something a woman has the right to choose.” Ania explained that our arguments are based on factual evidence and reasoning and challenged him to point out one display photo which carried any sort of religious connotation. He apologized for his incorrect assumption and aggressive tone. After 20 minutes of lively debate, the student smiled and said that, up until this point, he had thought all pro-lifers were screaming lunatics, but now he had been given a lot to think about. This stereotype of pro-lifers is largely due to the media’s portrayal of pro-lifers as holding an unreasonable position; our actions and arguments debunk it wherever we go.

Florida Gulf Coast University was the final stop on the tour, and it was the first time GAP had been on campus. The display was erected February 24-25 on the library lawn. Students and professors alike were shocked by the graphic photos; some students behaved very poorly and several professors were compelled to speak their minds about GAP.

GAP provokes many pro-aborts to grasp at straws to dissuade college students from looking at the “elephant in their living room”—CBR’s huge abortion photo mural display. Consider this twist on the common “don’t-

believe-everything-you-hear” phrase which came from Kris de Welde, Ph.D., the faculty advisory to the Gender Equality Organization at FGCU: “It [GAP] also has the intended effect of horrifying, but not necessarily educating, those who know little about abortion, human rights, genocide, and manipulation via imagery. ... Do not believe everything you see, and especially if what you see is meant to upset and disturb you. Ms. de Welde didn’t want students to believe even what they saw—the factual evidence that abortion is an act of violence which kills a baby. Then there was history professor John Cox, who wanted to argue semantics when interviewed by the school newspaper, “As a genocide scholar and author of an upcoming book on genocide in the modern world, my opinion is that the GAP’s use of the term ‘genocide’ is highly inaccurate, emotionally manipulative, and demagogic. Their use of the term also cheapens and trivializes the many episodes of genocide that have occurred in world history.

In contrast to the subject-changing tactics of these two teachers was Terry Wimberley, a professor of Ecological studies at FGCU. He wrote a guest commentary for Naplesnews.com which commended our GAP staff, but which also expressed dismay over some students’ behavior:

They [CBR staff and volunteers] rotated their duties over a period of several hours and demonstrated remarkable patience, commitment and courage in the face of some pretty aggressive and uncouth behavior on the part of a number of students.

As a bystander in the crowd, I could scarcely believe my eyes and ears. There I stood, on a campus that I had lovingly devoted a great deal of my professional life developing as one of the university’s founding deans, and surrounding me were students—“our students”—behaving savagely, showering the presenters with shouts, insults and epithets. At one point I heard students calling the female narrator with the exhibit a “Nazi,” “idiot,” “fool,” “imbecile” and “whore.” Thankfully, these reprobates were a minority among the crowd, though a vocal and abusive minority. <http://www.naplesnews.com/news/2010/feb/26/guest-commentary-embarrassing-spectacle-fgcu-abortion/>

Of the many students who were willing to quietly review the GAP display and seek answers to their questions, was Jared. He was in the middle ground on abortion as he began to speak with CCBR Executive Director Stephanie Gray. He offered all the usual arguments in favor of abortion. After nearly an hour, Jared prepared to leave and Stephanie

challenged him, “Jared, I want to leave you with this thought: Edmund Burke once said, ‘The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing.’” He replied, “That sounds like it’s made for me!” Stephanie told him, “Well, you’re a good man, Jared, so I hope it’s going to motivate you.” As he turned to leave he said, “Yeah, it will motivate me.”

Our GAP display and trained staff challenge students to do what is right, but often hard. In contrast, the majority of their professors promote destructive behaviors when it comes to difficult life problems like an unplanned pregnancy.

A male student told volunteer Ania that his sister had had an abortion three years ago, and he hadn’t really thought much of it until that day as he looked and listened at GAP. As she gave answers to his many questions, Ania sensed he was moving closer towards the pro-life position. Eventually he shook his head and said he would talk to his sister because there was no way she wasn’t still carrying this burden of having had an abortion. Immediately thereafter, Ania heard the student engaging his friends in a discussion. As they fired question after question at him, he replied with some of the arguments she had just presented.

Zain and Joelene Reddiar started a CBR-South Africa affiliate this winter; they came on the Florida GAP tour to get firsthand experience. Zain spoke with a student named Andrew for three hours. Andrew subsequently emailed Zain. He wrote, “I learned quite a bit from our conversations ... Your efforts to reach out to people on the subject are very appreciated.”

CBR IED (Improved Educational Devices)

CBR’S REGIONAL DIRECTORS HAVE DEVISED creative uses of CBR educational tools over the years. CBR Florida was invited to participate when Stand4Life organized pro-life Christians from many churches to pray at all 67 abortion clinics across the state of Florida on May 1, 2010. Mike Schrimsher, CBR Florida director, created a new application for our 4’x8’ GAP signs when he mounted them on both side of a 1979 VW bus. He called it an IED (Improved Educational Device).

The VW bus accompanied two of the CBR Reproductive “Choice” Campaign abortion photo trucks as they sought to photo-educate at the five abortion mills in Orlando. They also covered the Planned Parenthood office near University of Central Florida (they dispense Plan B and prescriptions for chemical abortions). The VW bus could navigate the smaller side streets and public parking lots (with one of our security vehicles following) where the too-large trucks could not go.

It was a family affair for Mike because his two oldest sons and daughter participated in prayer at two of the clinics and his next two sons were in the CBR vehicles. An Earth Day Birthday rock concert at the Citrus Bowl, a few blocks from the main PP office, afforded our crew the opportunity to reach that crowd.

Mike reported: “Some folks out on the road were really unhappy with the abortion imagery on the VW bus. I think there was extra cognitive dissonance achieved because of what

those old hippie/surfer vehicles represent to someone of my vintage: peace and love, sex, drugs, rock and roll, etc.”
